

Job Preview – Car Wash Attendant and Upstairs Oil Change Technician Role

Within the automotive industry, regular vehicle maintenance is highly recommended to ensure smooth operation, prevent costly repairs, and protect the value and appearance of a vehicle. Two essential maintenance activities include washing of vehicles and performing regular oil changes. This job preview focuses on the roles of people who carry out these activities, commonly referred to as 'Car Wash Attendants' and 'Oil Change Technicians'. We'll be highlighting some of the common tasks performed, as well as some of the challenges of these jobs to help you gain a better understanding about these important service positions. Let's get started!

The role of a Car Wash Attendant is to ensure that vehicles enter the car wash bay in a timely fashion, and exit sparkling clean! Tasks may include pre-washing vehicles to remove bugs, mud and debris, and guiding drivers safely onto the conveyor. Other key responsibilities may include cleaning the car wash brushes and equipment, filling detergent bottles, squeegeeing the bay floors and observation windows, and emptying the car vacuums.

If you like working on your own, this position offers an independent work environment with limited social interaction. Tasks require attention to detail and are routine based, though you may be asked to respond to unexpected problems from time to time. Training for this role is often by example, and you will be able to see it demonstrated and participate while you learn. Expectations are clear, and consistent feedback and team support will help ensure you can to do your best on the job.

There are some challenges to the Car Wash Attendant job. Some days can be busy with a steady stream of vehicles needing to move quickly through the car wash to prevent long line-ups. You will be on your feet all day, working in an open bay with temperatures varying year-round, and you will need to stay focused and on task for the entire shift. You will also be subject to strong chemical smells and loud car wash equipment. As with most service jobs, there is the possibility of receiving customer complaints, so you must be able to listen effectively and escalate issues to your manager if needed.

Now let's consider another service role within the automotive industry - the job of an Oil Change Technician, specifically an 'Upstairs Technician'. Key activities in this role include guiding customers into the service bays, collecting customer and vehicle information, discussing the various products and services they would like to purchase, and then communicating with the Downstairs Oil Change Technician so they know what services to perform.

While the Downstairs Technician is completing the service requested, you will be responsible for checking the air filter, tire pressure, fluid levels, and other key component such as the headlights, taillights and windshield wipers to ensure they are working properly. When the service work is complete, you will process the customer's payment. To ensure a safe and well-organized facility, you will be expected to perform general cleaning duties such as sweeping, dusting, cleaning up spills, and taking out the garbage.

While you will be working in a supportive team environment, many of your work activities will be performed independently using a clearly defined checklist including tasks that are often repetitive and predictable. Training for this role is often visual, and learning occurs via hand-on experiences.

There are some challenges to the Oil Change Upstairs Technician job. You will be working in a noisy environment with varying temperatures as the bay doors open and close frequently. Awareness of the facility space and those working around you is important to ensure everyone's safety. Work tasks may vary depending on the customer's service needs and vehicle model. Good communication and problem solving skills are important to ensure customers' needs are addressed, and to assist the Downstairs Technician when required. The job is often fast paced and your work activities time sensitive to deliver quick and efficient service.

For both the Car Wash Attendant and Oil Change Upstairs Technician jobs, dependability and a positive attitude are important. You'll also be able to learn tasks that are transferable to other positions and industries. For example, the skills you develop and gain as a Car Wash Attendant could be applied in the role of a gas station attendant or car wash supervisor, or within a janitorial or housekeeping service. The skills you develop as an Oil Change Upstairs Technician could be applied to becoming an Oil Change Downstairs Technician, or a customer service clerk in a variety of industries, or you may consider an apprenticeship as a mechanic.
